The POST Plan will:


- Guide the next 15 years in future facility development,

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Parks



Publicly owned spaces dedicated to recreation like playgrounds, dog parks, sports fields

Open Space



Amenities like schools and sports fields, golf course, cemeteries, and natural areas

Trails



Linear paths for walking, biking, hiking and snowmobiling, including routes you might take to access parks











Vision



Rome Parks Outdoor Space and Trails (POST) system is a focus and point of **pride for the community.** The POST system is successfully serving the local community and attracts visitors because of its accessibility and variety of offerings to all age groups and abilities. The system is well maintained and offers a wide variety of amenities without **overextending** the ability of the city to care for and improve the system. Rome POST are heavily used by the community and groups for activities, sports, relaxation, and are places of safe gathering that highlight the local history heritage of the area.

- reliably accessible for all users throughout the City









Parks Usage – Cell Phone Data

Limitations

- Utilizes existing data to estimate foot traffic.
- Those without phones aren't counted

- 4% increase in visits from 2019-2024
 - Parks and Open Spaces saw little increase
 - Trails and arenas saw a 35% increase
 - Bellamy Park, Kennedy Arena saw a large increase in visitors
 - Kost Field and Delutis Field saw a decrease in visitors
 - Community parks were stable
- Decrease in visitors from Rome (13440),
- Few winter visits





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

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Level of Service (LOS) Analysis


Compares City of Rome to peer cities/towns

Gap Analysis

What is a Gap Analysis?

- Looks at where parks, open spaces, and trails are in relation to people
- Asks Where are people traveling far for parks? Where are amenities clustered too close together? And where should new amenities go?
- 1. Parks
- 2. Trails
- 3. Playgrounds
- 4. Aquatic Facilities








Gap Analysis - Parks

Methodology

- Buffered distances from residential parcels.
- .25 mile Desired distance
- .5mile Acceptable distance | Served
- 1mi maximum walkable
- > 1 mi Unserved

- Areas to the north and south of the city center may see gaps in parks access
- Outlying communities are largely unserved by parks.







Gap Analysis – Trailheads


Methodology

- Buffered distances from residential parcels.
- .25 mile Desired distance
- .5mile Acceptable distance

Served

> .5mi – Unserved

- Trails are concentrated in the east of the city, near resources such as Griffis AFB, the Mohawk River, and the Erie Canal
- Largest gap in the northwest of the city center, outlying communities







Gap Analysis – Playgrounds


Methodology

- Buffered distances from residential parcels.
- .25 mile Desired distance
- .5mile Acceptable distance

stance 🟲 Served

> .5mi – Unserved

- Between parks and schools, the city is geographically well served with playgrounds
- Gap along the Chestnut Street Corridor
- Outlying communities are largely unserved







There is desire for more water activates, such as splash pads or amenities at pools.




Trails should connect the community to parks
